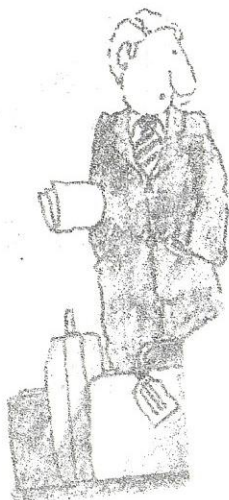

DEATH GRANT

Some weeks ago we gave you information on medical cards. However, if in spite of the best of medical attention, the Great Reaper in the sky still gets you, the information we give this week may be of interest.

WHOSE DEATH?

A death grant is payable on the death of:

- (i) An insured person
- (ii) Wife or husband of an insured person
- (iii) A child - under 18 - of an insured person.

THERE MUST BE INSURANCE STAMPS

The death grant is a social insurance benefit and payment will depend on whether there is enough social insurance paid up.

The grant may be paid on the death of an adult if the deceased had paid the required social insurance of it has been paid by the spouse (living or dead).

A death grant may be made on the death of a child if the father and/or mother has insurance which meets the standard.

INSURANCE FROM 1970 ONLY

Insurance contributions

from 1st October 1970 contain an element towards the cost of this grant and only insurance from that date counts.

HOW MANY STAMPS?

- (i) There must be at least 26 contributions paid between 1/10/1970 and the date of death.
- (ii) There is a full grant and a reduced grant. 26 contributions are needed for the reduced grant and a yearly average of 48 are necessary for the full grant.
- (iii) There must be at least 26 contributions paid or credited in the last complete contribution year, before the beginning of the benefit year in which the death occurred.

CONTRIBUTION YEAR - the year covered by the insurance card.

BENEFIT YEAR - starts 5 months after the contribution year - for a man in June and for a woman in December.

This condition may be satisfied if a yearly average of 26 contributions has been paid since 1/10/70 or from the date of entry into insurance - whichever is later.

HOW TO CLAIM

This grant may be claimed within 3 months of the date of death. The forms for claiming can be obtained from the Department of Social Welfare, Townsend St. Dublin 2.

AND WHAT ABOUT THE WEEKLY BENEFITS LOST?

Apart from the above grant, weekly benefits, pensions and allowances - which include an allowance for an adult dependent - will be continued in payment for 6 weeks after the death of the beneficiary.

COISTE FORBARTHA NA CARRAIGE

At the January meeting of Carrick Development Committee a review was made of the years events.

The Chairman, Brian McAuley reported that the committee had held 13 meetings since its inception in December 1976. 22 people have been involved in committee work since then. The committee has written 45 letters on various subjects and received many more which are kept in central community files.

The two major events organised by the Committee were the Carnival and a Christmas Concert. Other subjects which engaged the committee's attention were; Tidy Towns, A sewage scheme, the local doctor, piped t.v., the bin route, the local vocational school and the Gaeltacht Community Scheme.

The situation with regard to a community centre was outlined and the chairman noted that new plans were being drawn up and would be put before the committee as soon as they were available.

Una Byrne mentioned that she had received a reply from Bord na Mona in Glenties with regard to our allegations of delays for local hauliers. The Board denied that there was any discrimination and said they had to operate a booking system. Nevertheless the committee was not happy that the situation was a fair one and decided to investigate further.

A letter was read from the County Council to Councillor Conall Doogan promising that the refuse route for Upper Carrick would be extended subject to reasonable costing. The Chairman thanked Councillor Doogan for achieving this break-through which the committee had been requesting for the past number of

months.

Referring to the decision of an earlier meeting to purchase a marquee from Con Hynes, Brian McAuley said he had been in touch with him and had made a date to view the marquee.

Una Byrne mentioned that there was still some doubt among fishermen as to what was happening with regard to Aughera Pier. It was decided to find out from Mr. O'Raghallaigh of Roinn na Gaeltachta what the position was. The question of the toilets on Teelin Pier was also discussed.

Michael Gallagher informed the committee that the T.V. interference had been fixed by the E.S.B. but Hugh Cunningham felt that something was still wrong. Francis Walshe said that there was some problem with the E.S.B. supply in Stralsel. He felt that the new transformer that had been installed was not functioning properly and it was decided to contact the E.S.B. about this.

The Committee meets again on Tuesday 28th February.

NATIONAL CONTEST

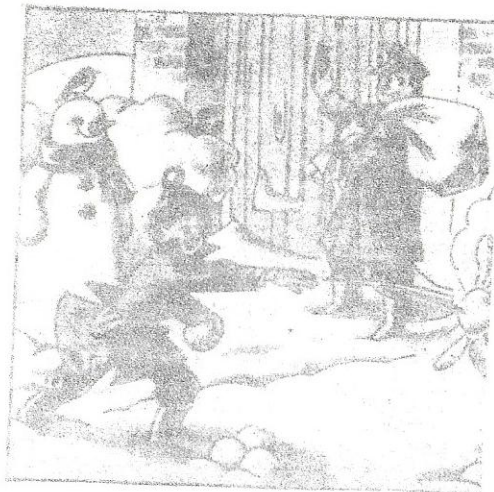
There were 120 entries for the competition and because of the success, Fr. McDyer announced plans for a national Competition in 1979.

Donegal prizes are £50 and £20.

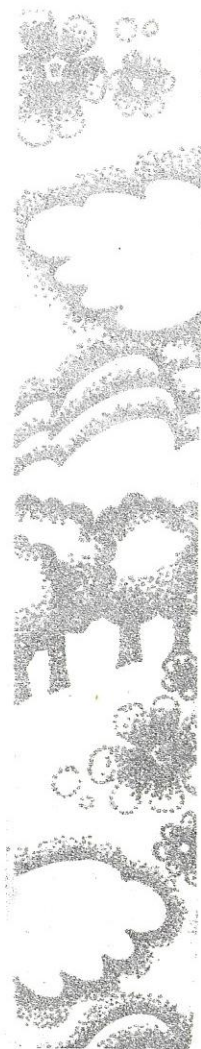
To the memory of Maggie O'Donnell, Druimnafinagle,

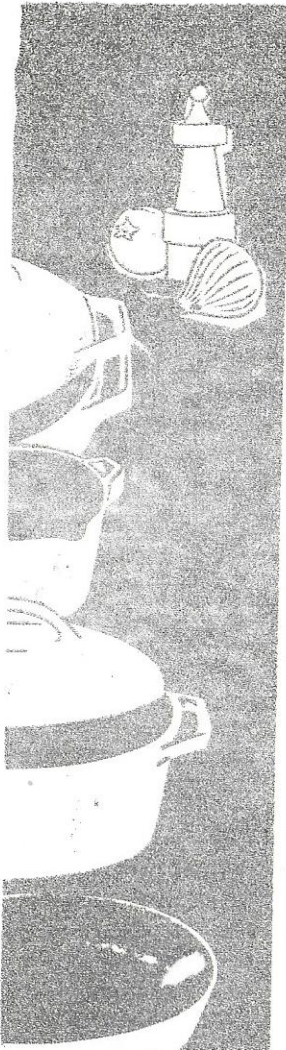

KITTY THE COOK'S CORNER

A tasty morsel is the offering this month.

CRUNCHIE SAUSAGE ROLLS

INGREDIENTS

8 thin slices of white bread
4 ozs. (100g) grated cheese
2 oz. table margarine
1 level teaspoon made mustard
 $\frac{1}{2}$ level teaspoon salt
8 sausages
wooden cocktail sticks.

METHOD

Remove the crusts from the bread and roll out lightly to make each slice thinner. Cream together the margarine, cheese, mustard and salt. Spread this mixture on the bread.

If the sausages are not skinless then skin them. An easy way to do this is to place them in boiling water and then the skins should come away easily.

Place a sausage on each slice and roll up. Cut each roll in half and secure with a wooden cocktail stick. Place on a well-greased tray and bake in a moderately hot oven, 400 deg. F. Gas Mark 6, for 25-30 minutes until golden brown and crisp. Serve hot.

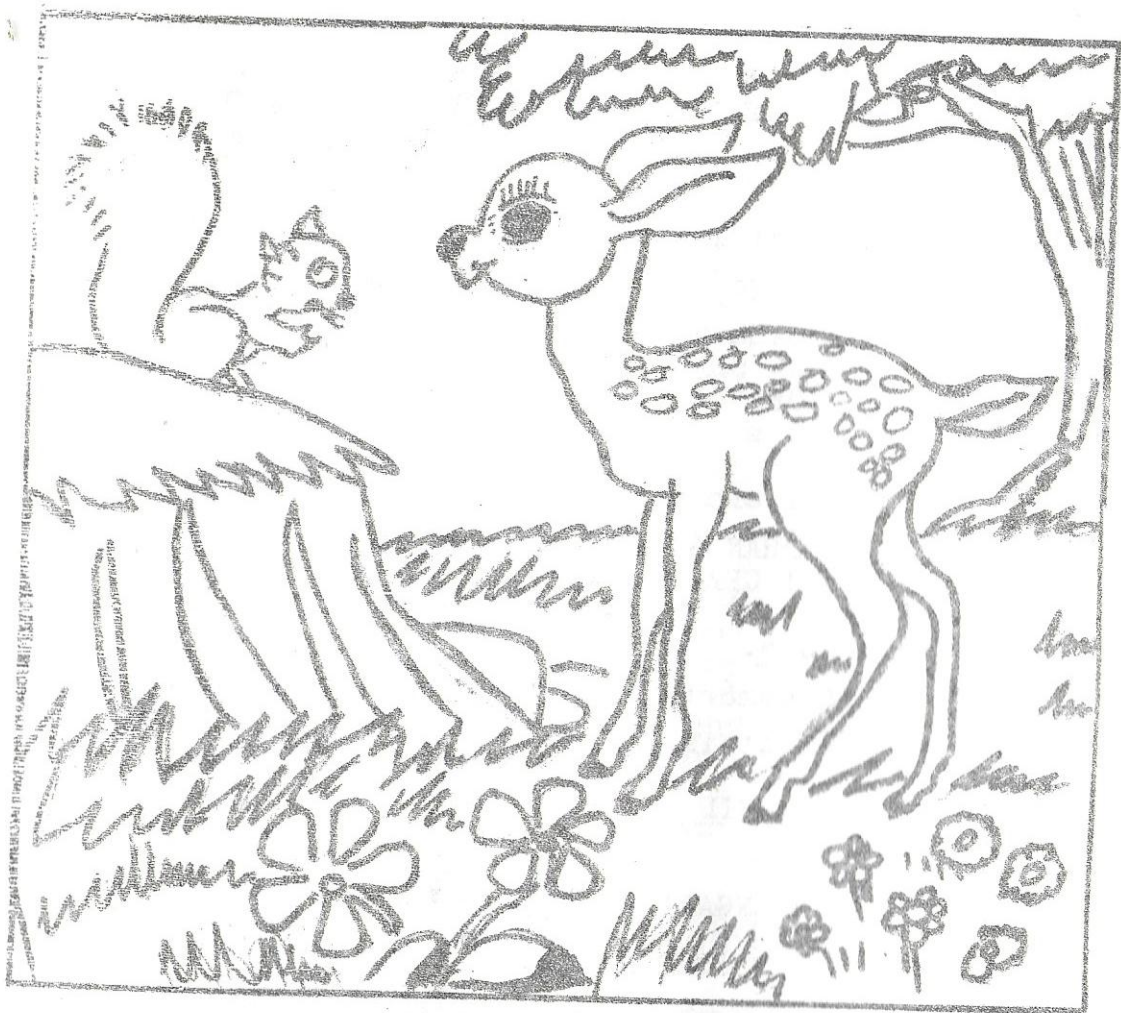

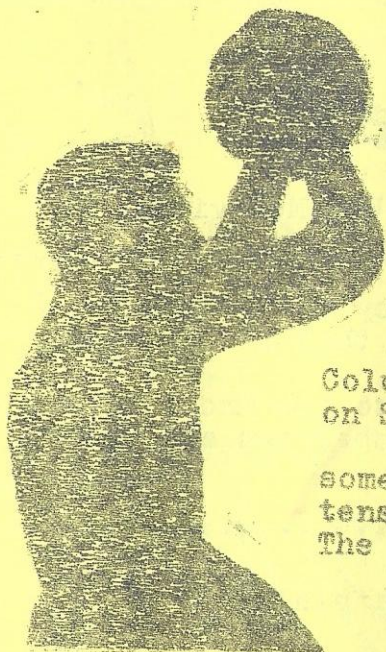
