“IT'S GLEN”

From this St. Columba's forged ahead and despite a goalmouth fracas when the Kilcar players deemed Micheal O Donabhain over his own goal line the Glen side finished worthy winners. Then there was a waiting time to see how Gweedore had fared in their match in Ballyshannon. The North county side had defeated Glen well in a match the previous Sunday and were the only remaining threat in the League.

Gweedore failed to defeat Ballyshannon and so St. Columba's team have won the Donegal Senior League for 1978. They have one more fixture to fulfill - against St. Eunan's in Glen and after that match, win-lose or draw they will receive the cup.

100 years ago.

THE RECENT DEMOLITION OF THE PAROCHIAL HOUSE BRINGS TO MIND THE STIRRING EVENTS THAT PRECEDED ITS BUILDING ALMOST EXACTLY A CENTURY AGO.

The house was built in 1877-78 for Fr. John McGroarty, who had just been evicted by the Musgraves from the house that is now Gallaghers on the Teelin Road.

The events of that time and the clash between the Musgraves and Fr. McGroarty seem almost incredible now but the 1870's like the 1970's were a time of change in Carrick and also the Musgraves and Fr. McGroarty were very different from those that went before them.

The Musgraves had bought the Glencolmbkille estate from the Connollys in 1869. The latter had been owners since at least 1798. Tradition has dealt kindly with the Connollys. They were landlords of the old school, never evicted anyone and helped their tenants as far as possible.

"Dark was the day for Carrick when Tom Connollys estates
Were purchased by the Musgraves, manufacturers
of grates."

The last of them to be associated with the parish has gone down in history as "honest Tom Connolly". The cynic might say that it was easy for him to be honest - his rent roll from the Glencolmcille Estate was £3,000 a year when he sold it. It is difficult to say what this would be worth in present day values - perhaps between £100,000 and £300,000 and this was a very small part of Connollys total income. Nor was he particularly generous. In 1846, when his tenants were starving, his contribution to the Teelin Carrick Relief Committee was £30 - just 1% of his annual rent for the area, though to be fair, it is doubtful if he collected very much rent that year. Indeed, it is difficult to know how much rent he collected in any year. At any rate in 1869 the Glencolmcille Estate was considered to be badly in debt and was sold to the Musgrave brothers. They paid £21,750 for 21,201 acres. The remainder of the parish - about 10,000 acres was on lease to the Humes of Glen and they were to pay the Musgraves £158 yearly as rent.

Hardheaded Belfast businessmen, the Musgraves had no time for the old style methods of the Connollys. They intended to run the estate at a profit and get a good return on their large investment. They immediately looked around for sources of revenue that the Connollys might have missed or not bothered about. Soon, there was a dispute with the Teelin fishermen about who might fish salmon and where.

There was a large amount of common land in the parish and the Musgraves determined to take as much of it as possible into their own hands. Steps were first taken in Upper Carrick. The Connollys had abolished the Rundale system in the Carrick

area about 1840 by striping the land (in Upper Carrick) between the river and the "Cross Ditch". From there northwest to Lough Unna was held by the tenants in common. The Musgraves built a fence - "The Wire Ditch" along the top of Upper Carrick hill and claimed the land north west of this to the lough for themselves, allowing the upper Carrick tenants to hold the land between the ditches as their commonage.

It wasn't long before these repressive measures began to encounter local resistance. Next month we will take a look at the man who spearheaded this resistance.



Advice Corner



THE PROTECTION OF YOUNG PERSONS

(EMPLOYMENT) ACT 1977

A new act was passed last year to protect young persons in employment. We all agree young people need rest in order that they may grow up in a healthy fashion. This is often forgotten when we ask them to work, especially, when by nature they are willing and enthusiastic.

To offset exploitation of the young the Government passed the above act which carries a fine of £100 on the employer for a first offence and £200 for a second offence. The main terms of the act are as follows:

1. PERSONS UNDER 14 YEARS OF AGE MAY NOT BE EMPLOYED.
2. PERSONS AGE 14
 - (a) May do light non-industrial work but not before 8 a.m. and not after 8 p.m.
 - (b) May work 2 hours a day only during schooldays and not more than 4 hours on EITHER Saturday or Sunday.
 - (c) May work only 7 hours a day during holidays to a maximum of 35 hours a week and must have 14 consecutive days holiday without work.
 - (d) There must be 14 hours between finishing work on one day and starting it on the next.
3. PERSONS AGED 15 years

- (a) Limited to 8 hours per day to a maximum of 40 hours per week.
- (b) Time worked over 37½ hours must be paid as overtime at a rate of time and a quarter.
- (c) In industrial work they cannot start before 8 a.m. and finish after 8 p.m. and in non-industrial work from 6 a.m. and not after 10 p.m.
- (d) They must have 12 hours rest between finishing work on one day and starting the next day.

PERSONS AGED 16 OR 17 YEARS

- (a) Maximum working hours are 9 a day or 45 a week with a limit of 172 hours in any four weeks.
- (b) Any time worked over 8 hours a day or 40 hours a week is considered as overtime.
- (c) The same hours for starting and finishing as in (c) above apply.




